Other News:

Year 11 – Year 11 students continue with a programme of intervention in preparation for their GCSE exams. During the half term break we welcomed over half the year group for sessions from maths, English and science. Following half term students are again completing their pre-public exams in English, maths and science.

Fifty Year 11 students took part in a Lifestyle Impact Workshop delivered through the University of Cumbria, students were challenged to consider how their current choices impact on their future choices. Feedback from students indicated that they enjoyed these sessions and made them consider options they previously had not thought about.

Gen II recently returned to the Academy to support a group of students in the completion of their application forms, all help and support offered to do this was greatly received. Students now await responses from Gen II, in anticipation of being selected for the next step in their application process.

Maths Challenge - It was the turn of the students in Years 9 and 10 to

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face the rigours of the Intermediate Maths Challenge this month. 32 of our brightest and best sat an hour's paper featuring maths-related puzzles, enigma and other fiendish challenges. All deserve our congratulations for their endeavours, but special praise is reserved for our prize winners. Well done to **Dylan Giles**, whose silver award ensured he was the pick of the Year 9 students. Two more silvers went to **Matthew Dwyer** and **Kim Farish** in Year 10, whilst **Dylan Bousfield**, also of that year group, claimed Bronze. Special mention must be made, however, of **Toby Matthews**, of Year 10, whose Gold Award was good enough to see him through to the next round. He will sit the intriguingly-entitled "Pink Kangaroo" on the 15th of this month. We look forward to bringing you details of the outcome, as well as perhaps some photographs of our prize winners with their certificates, in subsequent newsletters.

Music - On Friday 23rd February, a group of 33 KS3 students attended 'Sound & Fury', a performance by the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. The concert, at the Sands Centre, featured excerpts from works such as Romeo & Juliet by Prokofiev, Danse Macabre by Saint-Saens and Star Wars by John Williams. For

many of these students it was their first experience of a live professional orchestra.

The concert was organised by Cumbria Music Hub, as part of a project with some students from Trinity School.

Our students thoroughly enjoyed the experience. "I really enjoyed the Philharmonic. My favourite song they played was Pirates of the Caribbean". (**Madi Clarke**, Y7).

Science - Richard Rose Sixth Form students welcomed Peter Hoare from Newcastle University to demonstrate Spectroscopy in a Suitcase.

Spectroscopy in a Suitcase gives students the chance to learn about spectroscopy through hands-on

experience. As well as covering the principles of spectroscopic techniques, the activities use real-life contexts to demonstrate the applications of the techniques.

Peter was accompanied by students from Newcastle University to deliver the workshop. The University has a strong emphasis on encouraging our Sixth Form students to consider studying chemistry and also highlights the career opportunities available with chemistry qualifications.

Science Teacher at Central Academy, Mrs Cartmell said, "We were delighted to be able to welcome colleagues from Newcastle University to Central Academy to allow our students to take part in the workshop. It was a great hands on experience for them and gave them access to some cutting edge technology which is not normally available in a school environment."

Sport
